LETTER FROM THE

Director

Dear Supporters of Great River Rescue,

I am so proud of our staff, volunteers and supporters for their efforts in 2022. Admittedly, it was another year of uncertainty and challenges. As you know, there was inflation, supply shortages, workforce shortages, and so many other volatile things happening in the world that affected Great River Rescue. Across the entire shelter industry in the United States, we have seen an increase in animal admissions, and a decrease in outcomes. This is putting extra pressure on

shelters and rescues, foster caregivers, volunteers, and supporters.

Despite all of this, we remained steadfast in our work to save companion animals. We completed 342 adoptions, which was the most we've done since 2019. We continued to operate our low-cost spay/neuter program Pet Fixers and completed 664 spay/neuter surgeries. We also held three low-cost Wellness Clinics and served 90 pets with vaccinations and other preventative care treatments. In addition to this, our Outreach Committee got involved in various summer day camp programs, teaching over 700 kids about being safe around animals and responsible pet care.

Looking forward, I am very excited for the future. As 2022 ended, the Board of Directors and I were busy working on a new 5-year strategic plan. Some of the things we need to work on include expanding our facility capacity, improving our foster care program, and providing higher quality enrichment for our shelter animals. Ultimately, we need to find a way to attract a veterinarian to meet the needs of our on-site pets. We also need to significantly reduce the length-of-stay for our shelter pets so that they can be in homes, instead of a shelter.

Accomplishments

Once again, there were many challenges at GRR and in the world in 2022. However, we persevered and continued to work hard to save companion animal lives. Below is a list of just some of the things Great River Rescue accomplished in 2022:

Spayed/Neutered 664 pets through Pet Fixers

In 2022 we held eight clinics for the public, and had two clinics with Red Lake Rosie's Rescue.

Held three low-cost Wellness Clinics

Our Animal Welfare Committee, in coordination with shelter staff, successfully planned and implemented these clinics which served 90 pets with treatments.

Visited various summer camps to teach kids about being safe around animals

Our Outreach Committee, in coordination with shelter staff, visited several summer camps and reached over 700 kids with our educational materials.

Began impactful partnership with the Animal Humane Society

24 dogs were transported up from the Southern States all the way to GRR to be given a second chance at life.

Revitalized our Mod Squad program

Mod Squad training sessions were held this past summer and two new Mod Squad volunteers were added to the program.

Increased social media outreach

While our Facebook and Instagram following have continued to steadily increase, we launched a TikTok page which gets thousands of views



Financial Highlights

While Great River Rescue received substantial financial support from the community, expenses outpaced revenues in 2022. However, many of our indicators of financial health either remained steady or improved. Here are some of the highlights of our financial year:

- »Gift shop revenues increased by nearly 60% over 2021
- »Total donors increased again to 850 which is 53% higher than 2018
- » Average gift size declined which may reflect some of the economic challenges facing our donors
- »Total funds raised from fundraising increased again to double our total from 2018
- » Expenses were just under our budget projections - 99.26%
